





| Day 335: Jeremian 1-2 |
|-------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| Summary: God calls Jeremiah to be a prophet to the nations. Jeremiah begins |
| his ministry by warning Judah of their unfaithfulness and idolatry. |
| Day 336 : Jeremiah 3-4 |
| Summary: God calls Israel to repentance, promising restoration if they return |
| to Him. Jeremiah laments the coming destruction of Judah due to their sin. |
| Day 337: Jeremiah 5-6 |
| Summary: Jeremiah condemns Judah's wickedness and prophesies their |
| destruction at the hands of a foreign enemy, urging the people to repent. |
| Day 338: Jeremiah 7-8 |
| Summary: Jeremiah delivers a message at the temple, condemning Judah's |
| false confidence in religious rituals. He warns of the nation's coming |
| judgment. |
| Day 339 : Jeremiah 9-10 |
| Summary: Jeremiah laments the sins of the people and their refusal to know |
| God. He warns them of the vanity of trusting in idols and man-made wisdom. |
| Day 340 : Jeremiah 11-12 |
| Summary: Jeremiah confronts Judah for breaking their covenant with God. He |
| also questions why the wicked seem to prosper while the righteous suffer. |
| Day 341 : Jeremiah 13-14 |
| Summary: Jeremiah uses a linen belt as a symbol of Judah's pride and |
| eventual ruin. He continues to prophesy about the coming drought and |
| destruction due to their rebellion. |







| Day 342 : Jeremiah 15-16 |
|-----------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| Summary: Jeremiah prays for mercy, but God reaffirms His judgment on Judah. God instructs Jeremiah not to marry or have children, symbolizing the coming desolation. |
| Day 343: Jeremiah 17-18 Summary: Jeremiah warns the people of the consequences of trusting in human strength rather than God. He uses the potter's house as a metaphor for God's sovereign control over nations. |
| Day 344: Jeremiah 19-20 Summary: Jeremiah smashes a clay jar as a symbol of the destruction coming to Jerusalem. He faces persecution for his message but continues to proclaim God's truth. |
| Day 345: Jeremiah 21-22 Summary: Jeremiah delivers a message to King Zedekiah, warning that Jerusalem will fall to Babylon. He condemns the kings of Judah for their injustice and disobedience. |
| Day 346: Jeremiah 23-24 Summary: Jeremiah condemns the false prophets and promises the coming of the righteous branch, the Messiah. He uses a vision of two baskets of figs to symbolize the fates of the faithful and the unfaithful. |
| Day 347: Jeremiah 25-26 Summary: Jeremiah warns of the 70-year exile in Babylon. He faces threats of death for his prophecies but stands firm in delivering God's message. |







| Day 348 : Jeremiah 27-28 |
|-----------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| Summary: Jeremiah uses a yoke to symbolize Judah's coming submission to Babylon. A false prophet, Hananiah, opposes him and gives a false message of peace. |
| Day 349 : Jeremiah 29-30 <i>Summary</i> : Jeremiah writes a letter to the exiles in Babylon, encouraging them to settle there and seek God's peace. He also promises their eventual return and restoration. |
| Day 350: Jeremiah 31-32 Summary: God promises to make a new covenant with Israel, one written on their hearts. Jeremiah buys a field as a sign of hope for future restoration, even as the city faces destruction. |
| Day 351: Jeremiah 33-34 Summary: God reaffirms His promise to restore Judah and David's royal line. Jeremiah confronts the people for breaking their covenant to free their slaves. |
| Day 352 : Jeremiah 35-36 Summary: The Rechabites are praised for their obedience, in contrast to Judah's disobedience. Jeremiah's scroll is read to the king, who burns it in defiance of God's message. |
| Day 353 : Jeremiah 37-38 Summary: Jeremiah is imprisoned for prophesying Jerusalem's fall, but he remains faithful to delivering God's message. He is thrown into a cistern but later rescued. |







| L | Day 354: Jeremiah 39-40 Summary: Jerusalem is captured by the Babylonians, and King Zedekiah is taken prisoner. Jeremiah is freed and allowed to stay with the remnant in Judah. |

| | Day 355: Jeremiah 41-43 Summary: After the assassination of the governor Gedaliah, the remaining Jews flee to Egypt despite Jeremiah's warnings. Jeremiah prophesies that Egypt will also fall to Babylon. |
| | Day 356: Jeremiah 44-45 Summary: Jeremiah condemns the Jews in Egypt for their continued idolatry, warning of further judgment. He reassures his faithful scribe, Baruch, that God will preserve his life. |
| | Day 357: Jeremiah 46-47 Summary: God's judgment against Egypt is foretold, as well as the defeat of the Philistines by the Babylonians. The prophecies emphasize God's control over the nations. |
| | Day 358: Jeremiah 48-49 Summary: Jeremiah prophesies judgment against Moab, Ammon, and Edom for their pride and rebellion against God. Each nation faces destruction for their sins. |
| | Day 359: Jeremiah 50-51 Summary: A lengthy prophecy against Babylon is delivered, foretelling its downfall as judgment for its arrogance and cruelty toward God's people. Babylon's destruction is certain |







| Day 360: Jeremiah 52 |

| Summary: The final chapter recounts the fall of Jerusalem, the destruction of the temple, and the exile of Judah to Babylon, fulfilling Jeremiah's prophecies. |
| Day 361: Lamentations 1-2 Summary: Lamentations begins with a sorrowful reflection on the destruction of Jerusalem. The prophet mourns the city's fall and God's righteous anger against His people. |
| Day 362: Lamentations 3 Summary: The prophet expresses deep grief but also hope in God's mercy. He declares that God's compassions are new every morning and encourages the people to seek Him. |
| Day 363: Lamentations 4-5 Summary: The prophet continues to lament the suffering of Jerusalem but ends with a prayer for restoration and God's mercy on His people. |
| Day 364: Ezekiel 1-3 Summary: Ezekiel has a vision of God's glory and is called to be a prophet to the exiles in Babylon. God commissions him to speak His words, whether the people listen or not. |
| Day 365: Ezekiel 4-6 Summary: Ezekiel enacts symbolic prophecies of Jerusalem's siege and destruction. He warns of the judgment coming to Israel for their idolatry and rebellion |
